The Details:

Democracy, Independence, and Boston

Boston is often viewed as an example of American independence. The city was founded in 1630 and by 1635 had established Boston Latin School, the first public school in British America. A year later, Harvard was established as the first university in America. During the American Revolution, independence was pronounced in events like the Boston Massacre (1770), the Boston Tea Party (1773), The Battle of Bunker Hill (1775), and the Siege of Boston (1776). In the 19th century, Boston became a beacon of independence through the abolition movement, headquartering Abolitionist newspaper The Liberator and becoming a safe haven for the men and women who emancipated themselves and escaped slavery. As you creatively answer the contest question, What does the future of American Democracy look like? consider this history.

Submission Guidelines

Visual Art: Art can be hand drawn, painted, or done digitally. Size should be no more than 11x14 inches.

Poetry: Poem must fit on a single side paper no larger than 11x14 inches.

Video: Total time of video must not exceed 3 minutes.
