We really didn't want to flee our home even though people kept warning us that our village would be attacked. It was 6 o'clock on a very cold and dark morning in January. My father decided that we needed to flee our village when he knew that my uncle and his family were fleeing. We could hear the loud noises of vehicles and tanks getting closer – it was terrifying. They were attacking the village near us. I saw it with my own eyes from the roof of my house. The whole village was completely destroyed in a matter of two hours. We knew we would be next if we didn't leave. So, we fled and left everything behind. We didn't take anything with us except our IDs...

The journey from my village to Lebanon was the hardest. We didn't know if we were going to make it out of there alive... We could hear the airstrikes around us and see the destruction. On top of that, it was freezing, and the snow had covered the roads. On the way, my father's voice trembled as he told us that Syria was no longer our home...

Answer the following prompt in 3–5 sentences after exploring the site.

Thinking back to the overall information about your country, how does the family you looked at compare to the economic growth of the nation?

This family in Mexico appears to have more stability than many families in lower-income brackets, but their experience also shows some of the uneven impacts of economic growth in the country. Mexico's economy has experienced moderate growth in recent decades, with a growing middle class in urban areas. This family's situation reflects that: they own their apartment, have consistent access to basic services, and are able to save and plan leisure trips, which are all signs of relative financial security. Despite owning their home and running a business, the family still spends about 80% of their income on food, which suggests that their income does not stretch very far, even with both adults working a combined 70 hours a week. This highlights how cost of living and inflation may outpace earnings, especially for small business owners.
